HIGH-FLYER!

A HIGHAM Lane Sixth Form student is on cloud nine after being appointed Lord Lieutenant's Cadet for Warwickshire!

Flight Sergeant Paige, a member of 121 (Nuneaton) Squadron Air Training Corps, received the accolade from Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of the County of Warwickshire, Timothy Cox, during a special ceremony held at Shire Hall Council Chamber, Warwick.

As the Lord Lieutenant's Cadet, Paige's duties will include accompanying him at special civic and military engagements throughout Warwickshire.

Paige joined the Air Training Corps in July 2014, at the age of 12, and since then has consistently worked her way through the training classifications and rank structure, and is currently holding the Master Cadet classification and rank of Flight Sergeant.

She is a committed member of the Squadron and always takes an active part in the Unit's community activities, especially in her role as the Squadron's Banner Bearer, when she regularly supports the Royal British Legion and other ex-service organisation events.

The sky's the limit for Paige, who has been studying for her A-levels with the aspirations of becoming an air traffic controller. She is also taking full

advantage of the opportunity to gain further academic qualifications via the Cadet Vocational Qualifications Organisation, completing her Level 2 BTEC in Public Service, along with a BTEC in Aviation Studies, while also working towards her Duke of Edinburgh award.

Paige has also demonstrated outstanding potential as a young leader with her efforts being rewarded well before that of her peers following promotion to Sergeant in December 2016 and, subsequently, Flight Sergeant in September 2017.

The high-flyer has indeed shown that she has a creditable activity and academic training record, both on Squadron and at school. However, it is



her commitment to mentoring younger cadets and her work with the Squadron's Banner team, together with her drive to support the Unit's work within the local community, which proves she is a worthy candidate for the responsible post of Lord Lieutenant's Cadet.

As senior cadet within the Banner party, Paige helps train and encourage the younger members of the group to support the ex-service community. Most notably, she has been proactively engaged in street collections for the Royal Air Forces Association and Royal British Legion.

Lord Lieutenant Cox expressed his admiration for the outstanding achievements of his newly-appointed Cadet representative, saying: "Paige has set an excellent example to other young people and I am delighted to be able to recognise her outstanding service within the cadet forces by making this appointment. She is a credit to her parents, her Squadron and now the County!"

Paige has also shown a great interest in the Squadron's joint activities with the Nuneaton-based Veterans Contact Point and its work in support of the Armed Forces Covenant.

EARLIER this year, my son-in-law, Chris, casually mentioned that he was going to climb Scafell Pike — the highest mountain in England at 3,209ft above sea level — in aid of a charity called Zoë's Place.

I had previously climbed most of the peaks in the Lake District, but never got round to tackling the biggest challenge of all, so immediately volunteered myself!

When I mentioned it to my 17-year-old son, Tim, his immediate response was: "What? At your age!? I'd better come along so I can carry you down!" That's how he got roped in as well.

On the big day — May 2 — the weather was beautiful. Even so, our five-strong fund-raising team, which also included friends Dan and Sud, had prepared well as conditions in the Cumbrian mountains can change in a few seconds.

We carried rucksacks loaded with maps, compasses, whistles, food, drinks and the legendary Kendal mint cake!

The team completed the climb in three hours and I found it quite pleasant. At the summit, the views were wondrous, and I really felt a sense of achievement — I did not realise the worse was yet to come!

The trek down really jarred my knees and with each step the pain worsened! Even so, we made the descent in two hours and when we arrived at the campsite reflected on our glorious day which raised more than £500 for Zoë's Place.

I would thoroughly recommend mountain climbing to anyone but make sure you go with someone that knows what they are doing! A great day that I will always remember!

Once inside the venue, the party-goers enjoyed a sit-down meal before spending the remainder of the evening posing for


photographs and demonstrating their latest moves on the dance floor.

UNBEKNOWN to the majority of students and staff, teaching assistant Jimmy Quinn has a secret passion! He is a keen military historian, often contributing self-penned articles to various publications, and is also a dab-hand with an air brush when it comes to miniature modelling.

His keen eye for precise detail earned him a Bronze medal and two commendations at April's British Model Soldier Society Annual Show for his intricate 1/72 scale model of a German Army Sturm-Infanteriegeschütz 33B armoured vehicle.

Showing his dexterity with the pen, Mr Quinn also received the Editor's Trophy from *The Bulletin*, the BMSS magazine, for 'The Roman Army and Beyond' — a series of three articles looking at Roman armour.

A previous article for *Warwickshire Life*, entitled 'The Romans in Mancetter', examined the possible site of Boudicca's last battle near Nuneaton.

Mr Quinn later attended a conference on the last subject at Warwickshire University, where academics and historians discussed potential sites.

Following input from several sources, there is now a 'battle trail' around Mancetter with information boards displaying details.

Mr Quinn's latest article to be published in *The Bulletin* deals with the conversion of the Royal Scots Greys regiment from horses to tanks pre-World War II, before fighting in North Africa, which contains previously unpublished photographs.

Drivers reminded to park considerately!

A REMINDER to drivers who park in the vicinity of Higham Lane School while dropping off, or picking up, students.

Please can you all be considerate to our neighbours, other students and parents when parking, and also abide by the Highway Code, which states that:

- Vehicles must not cause an obstruction — this includes parking over dropped kerbs.
- Vehicles must not be parked within 10 metres (32ft) of a junction.
- Vehicles must not stop or park on the zig-zag lines outside the School gates.

● Vehicles partially parking on pavements to avoid causing obstruction should leave enough space for a mobility scooter or double buggy pushchair to get through. This means no vehicle should be parked wholly on the pavement.

Anyone seen contravening any of these laws is liable to receive a fixed penalty notice from one of the Police patrols who regularly carry out checks outside the School in the mornings and afternoons.

The Police also receive regular complaints about speeding on the streets surrounding the School, in particular

Higham Lane, Weddington Road and Hinckley Road.

Both Weddington Road and Hinckley Road are limited to a maximum of 30mph while the majority of Higham Lane is also restricted to the same urban national speed limit. Please adhere to the speed limits stated by the signs.

There are other schools and several residential properties around these roads, so please be mindful of your speed at all times.

The other game finished Poland 0, Italy 0, leaving John Griffiths' girls in a must-win situation in their final group match against Italy while hoping that Spain could avoid defeat against Poland.

The Italians proved stiff opposition in the first half and, at the turn around, the teams were level at 0-0. As the second half got underway, England began to dominate and made the breakthrough in the 47th minute when Salmon fired home the first of an 18-minute hat-trick, while an Annabel Blanchard strike sealed an emphatic 4-0 victory with eight minutes remaining on the clock.

The result put Italy out of the competition while England marched on into the semi-finals where they faced favourites Germany, who had demolished Lithuania 8-0 in their final

Group A fixture, while runners-up Finland would meet Group B winners Spain.

Unfortunately for the Lionesses, it was a

repeat performance from the rampant German team who blitzed England 8-0, Shekiera Martinez's hat-trick making it a joint record nine-goal tally for a Euro finals, with the final against Spain still to come. This left England needing a victory in the third place play-off with Finland to be in the draw for this year's World Cup, being staged in Uruguay from November 13 to December 1.

With everything to play for, England took the lead in the 12th minute thanks to a Park strike, an advantage they maintained until half-time.

Sadly, the Lionesses suffered heart-break in the second half, conceding two goals from Annija Huhta (46) and Jenni Kantanen (61) to lose 2-1, and their World Cup dream was over!

The final — Germany v Spain — was the third successive year these countries had contested the European final.

Revenge was sweet this time for Spain as — having lost the 2016 and 2017 finals — they lifted the coveted crown with a 2-0 victory courtesy of two second half goals from captain, Eva Maria Navarro.

WORLD CUP



HEARTBREAK!

HIGHAM Lane's hot shot international footballer, Asmita (11L1) and her team-mates were left heart-broken after England narrowly failed to gain a lucrative place in this year's FIFA Women's World Cup!

Following success in last year's UEFA Women's Under-17 European Championship group qualifying stages as one of seven winners, the Young Lionesses progressed to the Elite round of the competition, held in March.

Drawn in Group 5, England notched up two victories



against Switzerland (4-0) and Norway (2-0), while the game against a resolute Slovenia team finished 0-0.

As in the three group matches, the Lionesses' stoic defence, with Asmita at the helm, stood firm and did not

concede — their record in the competition so far reading: played six, won five, drew one, goals for 25, goals against 0!

As a result, England joined seven other qualifiers at May's European finals. Drawn in Group B, the team were pitted against Poland, Italy and three times winners Spain; while powerhouse Germany — chasing a third successive straight title — Finland, the Netherlands and hosts, Lithuania, made up Group A.

To say a lot was at stake is an under-statement as the top three Euro finishers would gain qualification for the 2018 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup, being held later this year.

In the first group game of the finals, England faced a strong Poland side, who took a 1-0 lead early in the second half.

Undaunted, the Lionesses showed great composure and, thanks to two quality strikes in the 58th and 68th minutes from Jessica Park and Paris McKenzie respectively, led 2-1 as the final whistle beckoned.

Undeterred, the dogged Poland team — European champions in 2013 — battled until the end and grabbed a dramatic late equaliser in the second minute of added-on time to level the score 2-2.

England's next game was against triple Euro winners Spain, champions in 2010, 2011 and 2015.

The Lionesses soon found themselves a goal in arrears on four minutes but, after
